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Recall election of Boggs moved to May 3

If you were anxiously waiting for your mail ballot for the recall election of Glacier County Treasurer Mary Ann Boggs to arrive, you'll have to wait a little longer. The ballots were scheduled to be mailed out today, March 9, but due to required notices not being published correctly by Glacier County Election Administrator Glenda Hall, the March 29 election must be rescheduled.

Glacier Attorney's Office issued the following press release on

"It has come to the attention of the Glacier County Administrator that required notices relating to the recall election of Treasurer Mary Ann Boggs require re-publication. In order to comply with Montana law, the decision has been made by the Election Administrator to submit a revised plan for approval to the Montana Secretary of State. It is anticipated the recall election will now be held May 3, 2016, and ballots will be mailed out on April 13, 2016. These dates are pending final approval by the Secretary of State."

According to the "Mail Written Plan, Timetable and Instructions" approved by the Secretary of State's Office and "affirmed" by Hall, "Close of Voter Registration and Availability of Late Registration" notices were supposed to be published on Feb. 3, Feb. 10 and Feb. 24 as required by state law. Instead Hall requested the notices be published in the Cut Bank Pioneer Press and Glacier Reporter on Feb. 17 and Feb. 24.

The plan also stipulated the "Notice of Election" should be published on Feb. 24 and March 2 as required by state law. The notice was not sent to the newspapers for publication until March 2. On that day, Hall faxed a copy of the required notice to the Cut Bank Pioneer Press office shortly before 2 p.m. requesting the notice be published on March 9, March 16 and March 23 in the Pioneer Press and Glacier Reporter.

On numerous occasions this newspaper contacted Glacier County officials expressing concern the notices were not being published according to the plan.

Deputy County Attorney Mark Westveer contacted this newspaper on March 2 and requested the notice submitted by Hall not be
